

Lyndon State College Announces 11 New Appointments to Faculty

LYNDONVILLE — Dr. Robert E. Long, president of Lyndon State College, has announced the appointment of new faculty members for the coming year.

Michael V. Sherbrook will be an instructor in the science department. Dr. Sherbrook received his B.S. from the University of Rochester in 1958, his M.S. from the same university in 1963, and in 1970 he obtained his Ph.D. from the University of Chicago. Brenda F. Kohn has joined the science department as a laboratory assistant. Mrs. Kohn graduated from the University of Vermont in 1964 with a B.A. degree and earned the M.Ed. from the Boston University School of Education in 1967.

The new appointments in the social science department are Philip M. Allen and Darrell L. Casteel. Dr. Allen received his A.B. from Swarthmore College in 1953 and his Ph.D. in 1956 from the Graduate Institute of the Liberal Arts, Emory University. He is an authority on African affairs and has been with the African-American Institute since 1966. Before that he was with the United States Foreign Service. Casteel will be an instructor in anthropology. He is a graduate of Wichita State University where he received his B.A. in 1969 and

his M.A. in 1970. He has done extensive field work in Mexico.

The mathematics department's new instructor is Ronald P. Prinn. Prinn graduated from Middlebury College in 1952 with an A.B. degree and from Harvard University in 1955 with his M.A. Prinn has been a parish priest in the Episcopal Church for eight years and has taught mathematics at the Lyndon Institute. He is married and lives in Lyndonville.

In the education department, Mrs. Marion J. Perry will be an assistant professor, teaching the fifth grade at the Baker School. Mrs. Perry holds the M.Ed. in Elementary Education from Teachers College at Columbia University.

John L. Dundas has been named assistant professor in the modern languages department. He graduated from the State University of New York at Buffalo in 1963 and received his M.A. in 1970 from Middlebury College. He has taught high school French in Niagara Falls, N.Y., for five years.

Phillip D. Anderson is newly appointed assistant professor in the English department. He is a graduate of St. Cloud State College, Minnesota, where he

received his B.S. in 1962. In 1966 he obtained his M.A. from Indiana University. Anderson will be directing dramatic productions at the college and has had extensive experience in dramatic work, in both the technical field and acting. He has most recently directed dramatic and cultural programs for the Cambridge Community Center in Cambridge, Mass.

The psychology department has added as assistant professor, Frank N. Green and William F. Pepper, lecturer in psychology. Dr. Green received his B.A. from Colorado University in 1957, his M.A. from San Diego College in 1963, and his Ph.D. in 1970 from the United States International University. He has had extensive experience in teaching and administration on both elementary and secondary levels. Pepper is a graduate of Columbia College in 1959 with a B.A. degree and earned the M.A. from Columbia University in 1960. He is currently a doctoral candidate at the New School for Social Research in New York.

Mrs. Ellen Janson of Burlington has been named lecturer in art for the first semester.
